<p>Spelling Draw a picture of something that happens in your favourite story. Say a sentence about the story. Write the sentence together. Practise sounding/spelling out the words you want to write.</p>	<p>Reading Have a treasure hunt around the house/garden with simple clues e.g. Look under the bucket, go to the kitchen, find a red box, pick up the bag etc.</p>	<p>Writing Leave simple sentence messages around the house for your child to read e.g. 'It is time for bed.' 'Let's read a book.' 'Come for dinner.' 'I am in the garden.' Leave a notepad for your child to do the same for you.</p>	<p>Practical Act out a scene from your favourite book, film or TV show. Ask an adult at home to guess what it could be.</p>	<p>Maths Build a tower with 7 bricks. Can you build two more towers of bricks, one that uses one less than 7 bricks and one that uses one more than 7? Can you put these in an order? What do you notice?</p>
<p>Practical Use some soft furnishings and pegs to create a cosy den. This den can be for reading and relaxing.</p>	<p>Spelling Think of some words that you find hard to spell. Try and see if you can make up a rhyme to help you remember the spelling. It doesn't matter how silly your rhyme is, as long as you remember it! Write your rhyme down and bring it into school.</p>	<p>Maths There are 14 frogs on a log. 5 jump into the pond. How many frogs are left on the log? Can you draw a picture to show the number of frogs?</p>	<p>Writing Together, find a flower or minibeast outside. Encourage your child to look at it closely with a magnifying glass then photograph or draw it and label/caption or write a simple sentence about it. E.g. The bug has long legs. It has a hard shell.</p>	<p>Reading Have a video call with a relative. You could read them a story.</p>
<p>Maths Ask a grown-up to draw a spotty snake. How many spots does it have? Can you count them? Can you draw a snake that has one less spot?</p>	<p>Writing Look at things around the room. Try writing some of them down.</p>	<p>Practical Recycling Challenge! With an adult, look through your recycling bin for some clean items. What can you make with them?</p>	<p>Reading Read the end of a book. Imagine the beginning and middle to make up your own story</p>	<p>Spelling Make place cards for everyone by spelling their names and drawing a picture of their favourite thing.</p>
<p>Reading Make your own playdough or slime by following a recipe with help from an adult.</p>	<p>Practical Create a touch and feel box. Put an object in a box with a hand-sized hole. Can you guess what is inside the box just by feeling it? Challenge your family to have a turn too.</p>	<p>Spelling How many smaller words can you find in the word; important</p>	<p>Maths Park 5 toy cars in pretend car park. If 1 car drives away, will there be more or fewer cars? Drive 1 away and check by counting. Park a different number of cars in the car park and do this again.</p>	<p>Writing Story-writing - one person starts a story, then the next person continues it and so on until the whole story is complete. This could be just a spoken story or written down. You could draw pictures to accompany your story too.</p>
<p>Writing How many nursery rhymes can you remember? Can you write a list of them?</p>	<p>Maths Cut some shapes out of paper and arrange them to create pictures and patterns.</p>	<p>Reading Look at a map and plan an adventure.</p>	<p>Spelling Write tricky words onto empty plastic bottles to create skittles. Ask a grown-up to call out a tricky word and try to knock down the correct bottle with a large ball.</p>	<p>Practical Make a simple bird feeder to hang outside.</p>
